Scholars to College Program Description, Admission Criteria, & Benefits

Program Description

Scholars to College is a free college-readiness program designed to prepare ambitious, academically-focused, underrepresented first-generation students from Durham County for success at a four-year college or university that best matches their personal, social, and financial interests and needs . Students attend programming at the Center and are supported by a College Readiness Counselor to enhance their academic, personal leadership, and socio-emotional skills. College Readiness Counselors act as mentors and advocates, supporting students in setting and achieving their goals throughout high school and building robust summers that include academic, career, and work/volunteer experiences.

Student Admission Criteria

The Center is committed to enrolling students who are the best fit for the support this program provides. We are seeking students who meet the following criteria:

Income & Residency: Because our program is designed to support students from Durham who face systemic barriers to educational opportunity, to be eligible for the program, students must live and attend school in Durham County, NC and demonstrate financial need according to federal income guidelines. Families whose students are selected for an interview will be asked to submit a copy of the most recent income tax return (sensitive information redacted) to verify their income levels. Families may check for eligibility using the chart provided (see page 4).

Leadership & Character: Students collaborate effectively with other students and adults, are contributing members of their schools and communities, display high levels of ambition and persistence in spite of challenges, and earn positive evaluations from their teachers and/or community leaders.

Academic Focus: Students have a history of academic success as evidenced by earning mostly A's and B's in school and consistently demonstrating proficiency on End of Grade (EOG) and End of Course (EOC) tests. Students should also demonstrate intellectual curiosity, commitment to their goals, and a *strong desire to achieve*.

Family Support: Successful engagement in the Scholars to College program requires that parents/caregivers make the commitment required to participate actively in the program, including providing or arranging transportation to programming, attending parent meetings, communicating with program staff, and partnering with the program to collaboratively support the student's development into a college-going student.



Program Benefits

Students selected for this free, four-year, year-round program will benefit from guidance and support in the areas critical to success both throughout high school and in a four year college or university:

1. Complete the application packet and submit using any of the following methods:

2. Ensure that two core academic subject teacher evaluations are submitted. Teachers may complete the Confidential Evaluation Form online at https://bit.lv/ScholarstoCollegeTeacherEvaluation2028

3. Check your email consistently-applicants will be contacted and informed of their application status. Applicants who will be considered for admission will be invited for an interview.



Scholars to College Program Income Eligibility Guidelines

(applicable to students applying for entry for the 2023-2024 school year)

Families must use their 2022 or 2023 tax returns and the chart below to determine their family's eligibility for either program

Income Eligibility: To be considered for the Scholars to College program, a family must have an adjusted gross income (AGI) that is less than or equals 200% of federal poverty guidelines (based on family size). These guidelines are below.

After reviewing this chart, if you have determined that your family meets the income eligibility requirements (your adjusted gross income for the year 2021 or 2022 is less than or equals the amount listed according to the size of household), proceed with the application process. Note that all applicants who submit their application will be asked to submit a copy of their 2021 or 2022 tax return with sensitive information concealed/blacked-out (Social Security Numbers, bank account and routing numbers). The program will use this information ONLY for program eligibility verification purposes and will destroy all copies you submit at the conclusion of the application period.

Q: Where Can I Find My Adjusted Gross Income?

A: Taxes are filed using the IRS Form 1040. Adjusted gross income can be found on line 11 of both the 2020 form (bit.ly/IRS1040Form2020) and the 2021 Form (bit.ly/IRS1040Form2021)

Q: What if I am not required to file taxes due to disability, Social Security benefits, I earned too little, or other reasons?

A: Please submit a Benefit Verification Letter or a document that demonstrates the amount of income earned in the year 2021 or 2022 (e.g. a w-2) along with your Scholar's application.
